## The Conference Board® U.S. Business Cycle Indicators<sup>SM</sup>

# THE CONFERENCE BOARD LEADING ECONOMIC INDEX® (LEI) FOR THE UNITED STATES

#### AND RELATED COMPOSITE ECONOMIC INDEXES FOR JANUARY 2022

The Conference Board Leading Economic Index<sup>®</sup> (LEI) for the U.S. decreased 0.3 percent, The Conference Board Coincident Economic Index<sup>®</sup> (CEI) increased 0.5 percent, and The Conference Board Lagging Economic Index<sup>®</sup> (LAG) increased 0.7 percent in January.

The February 18, 2022 release incorporates annual benchmark revisions to the U.S. composite economic indexes, which bring them up-to-date with revisions in the source data. These revisions do not change the cyclical properties of the indexes. The indexes are updated throughout the year, but only for the previous six months. Data revisions that fall outside of the moving six-month window are not incorporated until the benchmark revision is made and the entire histories of the indexes are recomputed.

In addition, please note that underlying data input for the Leading Credit Index<sup>TM</sup> (LCI), a component of the LEI, has been updated with the February 2022 release. With this release and going forward, LCI calculations (from 1998 to 2014) use the primary dealers' overnight Treasury repo rate and (from 2014 to the present) the SOFR (90-Day Average Secured Overnight Financing Rate) published by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York instead of the LIBOR rate previously used. LIBOR remains in the LCI calculations from 1990 to 1998. This previously announced change was not implemented in the January 21, 2022 release due to a technical error.

As a result, these benchmark revisions, the entire history of the U.S. composite economic indexes have been revised, in levels and month-on-month changes, and will not be directly comparable to data issued prior to this benchmark revision, including the January 2022 benchmark. These revisions do not change the cyclical properties of the indexes.

- The Conference Board LEI for the U.S. declined slightly in January. Large negative contributions from initial claims for unemployment insurance (inverted) and consumer expectations for business conditions more than offset positive contributions from the other components. In the six-month period ending January 2022, the leading economic index increased 2.6 percent (about a 5.2 percent annual rate), slower than the growth of 4.6 percent (about a 9.4 percent annual rate) over the previous six months. However, over the same period, the strengths among the leading indicators have remained more widespread than weaknesses.
- The Conference Board CEI for the U.S., a measure of current economic activity, increased in January. The coincident economic index rose 1.4 percent (about a 2.8 percent annual rate) between July 2021 and January 2022, slightly slower than the growth of 1.5 percent (about a 3.1 percent annual rate) over the previous six months. However, the strengths among the coincident indicators have remained very widespread, with all components advancing over the past six months. The lagging economic index also continued to rise, and at a faster rate than the CEI. As a result, the coincident-to-lagging ratio is down slightly. Real GDP expanded at a 6.9 percent annual rate in the last quarter of 2021, after increasing 2.3 percent (annual rate) in the third quarter.
- The Conference Board LEI for the U.S. decreased for the first time since February of 2021. However, its six-month growth is still positive with widespread strengths among its components. While The Conference Board CEI for the U.S. has been rising through January its six-month growth rate remained steady. Despite the monthly decline in LEI, the recent behavior of the composite indexes and their components suggests that the expansion in economic activity should continue in the near term.

<u>LEADING INDICATORS.</u> Six of the ten indicators that comprise The Conference Board LEI for the U.S. increased in January. The positive contributors – beginning with the largest positive contributor – were the interest rate spread, the ISM® New Orders Index, the Leading Credit Index<sup>TM</sup> (inverted), manufacturers' new orders for nondefense capital goods excluding aircraft\*, building permits, and manufacturers' new orders for consumer goods and materials\*. The negative contributors – beginning with the largest negative contributor – were average weekly initial claims for unemployment insurance (inverted), average consumer expectations for business conditions, stock prices, and average weekly manufacturing hours.

The LEI for the U.S. decreased 0.3 percent in January and now stands at 119.6 (2016=100). Based on revised data, this index increased 0.7 percent in December and increased 0.8 percent in November. Over the six-month span through January, the leading economic index increased 2.6 percent, with seven out of ten components advancing (diffusion index, six-month span equals 70 percent).

<u>COINCIDENT INDICATORS.</u> All four indicators that comprise The Conference Board CEI for the U.S. increased in January. The positive contributors to the index – beginning with the largest positive contributor – were industrial production, employees on nonagricultural payrolls, personal income less transfer payments\*, and manufacturing and trade sales\*.

The CEI increased 0.5 percent in January and now stands at 107.9 (2016=100). Based on revised data, this index increased 0.2 percent in both December and in November. During the six-month period through January, the coincident economic index increased 1.4 percent, with four out of four components advancing (diffusion index, six-month span equals 100 percent).

<u>LAGGING INDICATORS.</u> The Conference Board Lagging Economic Index for the U.S. increased 0.7 percent in January and now stands at 110.2 (2016=100), with four of its seven components advancing. The positive contributors to the index – beginning with the largest positive contributor – were the average duration of unemployment (inverted), the change in CPI for services, commercial and industrial loans outstanding\*, and the ratio of consumer installment credit outstanding to personal income\*. The negative contributor was the change in the index of labor cost per unit of output, manufacturing\*. The ratio of manufacturing and trade inventories to sales\* and the average prime rate charged by banks held steady in January. Based on revised data, the lagging economic index increased 0.4 percent in December and increased 0.1 percent in November.

#### DATA AVAILABILITY AND NOTES.

The data series used to compute **The Conference Board Leading Economic Index**<sup>®</sup> (LEI) for the U.S., **The Conference Board Coincident Economic Index**<sup>®</sup> (CEI) for the U.S. and **The Conference Board Lagging Economic Index**<sup>®</sup> (LAG) for the U.S. and reported in the tables in this release are those available "as of" 8:30 am ET on February 17, 2022. Some series are estimated as noted below.

\* Series in The Conference Board LEI for the U.S. based on our estimates are manufacturers' new orders for consumer goods and materials and manufacturers' new orders for nondefense capital goods excluding aircraft. Series in The Conference Board CEI for the U.S. that are based on our estimates are personal income less transfer payments and manufacturing and trade sales. Series in The Conference Board LAG for the U.S. that are based on our estimates are manufacturing and trade inventories to sales ratio, the change in labor cost per unit of output, manufacturing, consumer installment credit to income ratio, and the personal consumption expenditure deflator used to deflate commercial and industrial loans outstanding.

The procedure used to estimate the current month's personal consumption expenditure deflator (used in the calculation of commercial and industrial loans outstanding) incorporates the current month's consumer price index when it is available before the release of The Conference Board LEI for the U.S.

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THE CYCLICAL INDICATOR APPROACH. The composite economic indexes are the key elements in an analytic system designed to signal peaks and troughs in the business cycle. The leading, coincident, and lagging economic indexes are essentially composite averages of several individual leading, coincident, or lagging indicators. (See page 3 for details.) They are constructed to summarize and reveal common turning point patterns in economic data in a clearer and more convincing manner than any individual component—primarily because they smooth out some of the volatility of individual components.

Historically, the cyclical turning points in The Conference Board LEI for the U.S. have occurred before those in aggregate economic activity, while the cyclical turning points in The Conference Board CEI for the U.S. have occurred at about the same time as those in aggregate economic activity. The cyclical turning points in The Conference Board LAG for the U.S. generally have occurred after those in aggregate economic activity.

#### Notes:

The component factors are inversely related to the standard deviation of the month-to-month changes in each component. They are used to equalize the volatility of the contribution from each component and are "normalized" to sum to 1. When one or more components are missing, the other factors are adjusted proportionately to ensure that the total continues to sum to 1.

These factors were revised effective with the release in February 2022, and all historical values for the three composite economic indexes were revised at this time to reflect the changes. (Under normal circumstances, updates to the leading, coincident, and lagging economic indexes only incorporate revisions to data over the past six months.) The factors for The Conference Board LEI for the U.S. were calculated using May 1990-December 2020 as the sample period for measuring volatility. A separate set of factors for the February 1959 - December 1977, January 1978 - December 1983 and January 1984 – April 1990 periods are available upon request. The primary sample period for the coincident and lagging economic indexes was February 1959 – December 2020. The trend adjustment factor for The Conference Board LEI for the U.S. is -0.0735 (over the 1984 – present) and 0.1156 (over the 1959-1983 period), and the trend adjustment factor for The Conference Board LAG for the U.S. is 0.1628.

To address the problem of lags in available data, those leading, coincident and lagging indicators that are not available at the time of publication are estimated using statistical imputation. An autoregressive model is used to estimate each unavailable component. The resulting indexes are therefore constructed using real and estimated data and will be revised as the unavailable data during the time of publication become available. Such revisions are part of the monthly data revisions, now a regular part of the U.S. Business Cycle Indicators program. The main

advantage of this procedure is to utilize in the leading economic index data such as stock prices, interest rate spread, and manufacturing hours that are available sooner than other data on real aspects of the economy such as manufacturers' new orders. Empirical research by The Conference Board suggests that there are real gains in adopting this procedure to make all the indicator series as up-to-date as possible.

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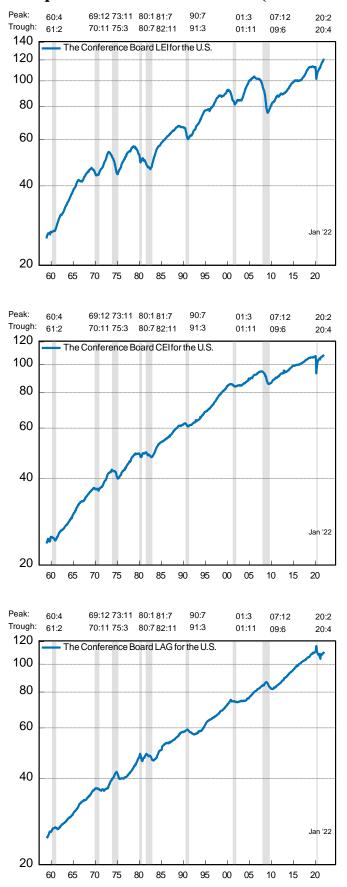

Shaded areas represent recessions as determined by the National Bureau of Economic Research.

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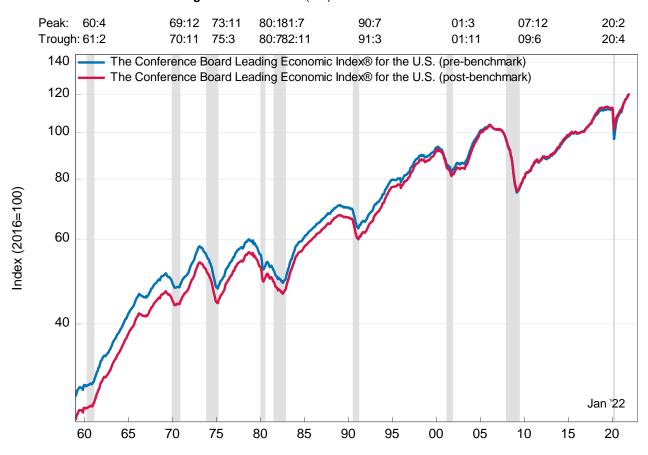
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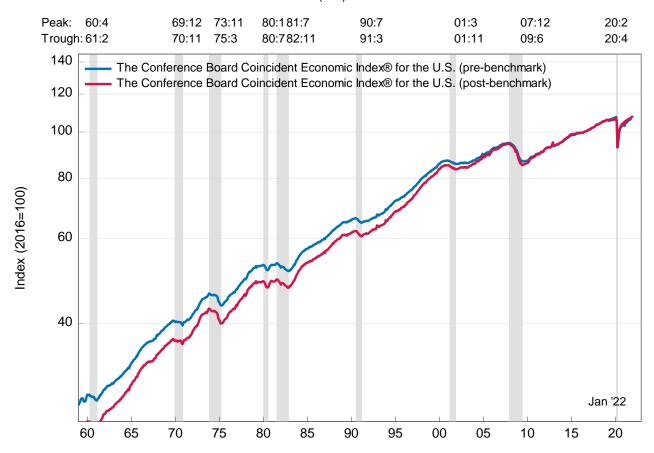
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#### The Conference Board Leading Economic Index® (LEI) for United States before and after benchmark revisions
